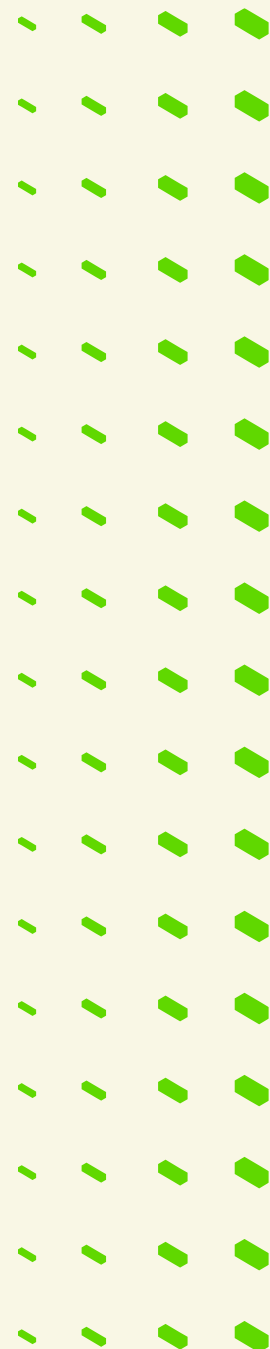

Sizewell Sustainability Group

Sustainability activities completed:

- **EHSS&Q Team build at local charity, the Wardens Trust.** The Wardens Trust are “*passionate about enabling disabled people to enjoy their lives as well as allowing carers respite and relaxation*”. The EHSS&Q team took great pleasure in carrying out various activities including painting, rebuilding of a firepit, constructing a compost bin and repairing broken benches to name but a few. The site will continue to look at future volunteering opportunities in future.
- **Reduction in conventional waste bins around the site** – an estimated reduction of 2800 single use plastic bags per annum.
- **NDA sustainability week (11th – 15th September)** – The team compiled various informative activities to raise awareness. Activities also included collaboration with the local RSPB, selling merchandise on behalf of the nature reserve at Minsmere. A total of £276 worth of products were sold to site personnel to help raise money for the reserve.
- **RICOH printer cartridges** – empty cartridges to be sent back to the supplier for recycling.



Turbine hall demolition – enabling works

- Residual asbestos strip work continues in the turbine hall
- De-plant activities started inside the turbine hall at the end of June, and are on-going
- Work will commence to remove the transformers from the north of the turbine hall in November
- Electrical annexe has been de-planted
- Lifting beam re-tested and returned to site (attached photo)

Legacy scaffold removal – progress

- Work continues in the R1CD Boiler House with the removal of the boards – now on lift 4 out of 14

ACP 1756 Ponds Scaffold Container Removal

- The ex-ponds scaffold store container has been removed from its elevated position by crane
- Flooring removed and remaining structure to undergo size-reduction to facilitate disposal as waste



ACP 1404 Remediation of Asbestos in General Areas

- Building 28 (Welfare Block) AIB removal to enable future metal work repairs completed.
- Numerous emergent work packages being addressed as 'business as usual'.

ACP 965 Improve Reactor Building Towns Main Water

- First two of three phases of modifications to Towns Main and Auxiliary Water supplies within the Reactor Building completed
- Improvements compliant with Water Supply (Water fitting) Regulations and the Legionella Codes of Practice



ACP 1754 Car Park Improvements

- Civils aspect of works in progress to improve safety, functionality and appearance of the main car park
- Work is aimed at improving layout configuration, road markings, drainage, pedestrian safety, traffic safety and general housekeeping

Bradwell ISF – Importation date extension

- Planning permission was granted in 2016 to import ILW packages until December 2023 from Dungeness A and Sizewell A
- Our operations, due to a number of factors including Covid, need to be extended until 2029
- Applications have been submitted to Essex County Council to change the date
- Consultation is currently taking place and a decision is likely to be made during October
- The total number of imported packages currently has a planning condition limit of 170 based upon current estimates



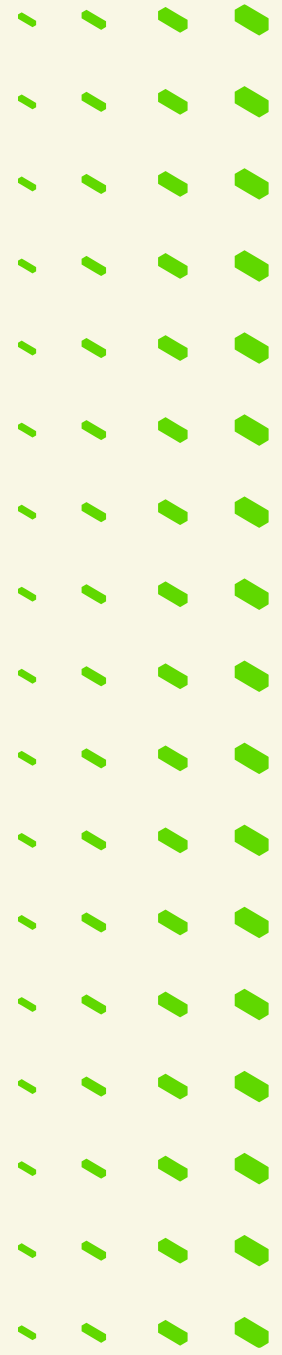
Recruitment

Significant recruitment has been progressed in the last 4 months:

- 3 new entrants
- 1 ASW transfer to permanent
- 6 internal promotions/development opportunities
- 5 Radiological Protection Technician Trainees
- 2 Radiological Protection Technician Apprentices
- 2 Engineering Apprentices (1 Civil, 1 Electrical)

4 approved positions are currently in process

- Waste Technician
- Radiological Protection Engineer A
- Environmental Advisor (Rad)



Sizewell A Soc-ec 2023/24

Magnox soc-ec funding remains at £1,020,035 annually available across all 12 Magnox sites, with £302,958 multi-year funding already committed. £948,335 has been allocated as of 11 October 2023. £29,215 remaining for this financial year
Plus £43,326 out of the £72,000 Good Neighbour allocation across the 12 sites.

4 successful funding requests for Sizewell totalling £56,020

Good neighbour funding £2,000 per application; however, £6,000 allocation per site remains unchanged. If you are applying for funding, you must be a constituted organisation and provide quotes for the items you are requesting. £3,880 remaining for Sizewell A.

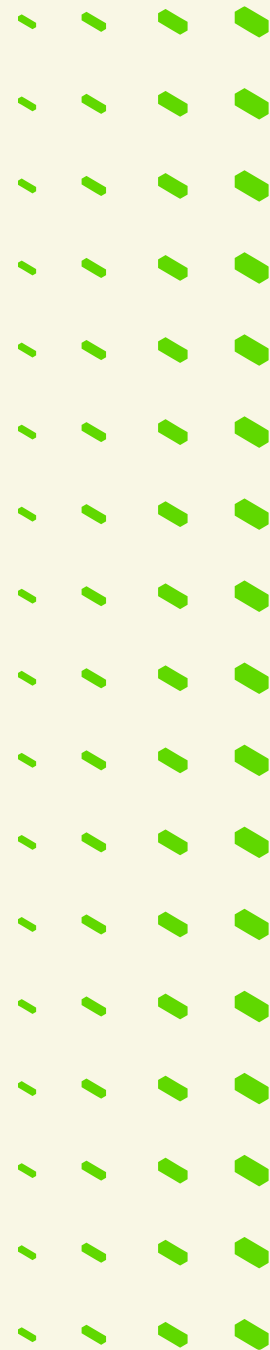

Sizewell A Soc-ec 2023/24

- Leiston Primary School £1,120 towards the purchase of two replacement interactive whiteboards
- Kesgrave Kestrels £1,000 towards new kit for U16's team
- Saxmundham Art Station £22,500 revenue funding for work placement and internships and towards Local Cultural Education Partnership (LCEP) Coordinator (£90,000 over three years)
- Leiston Long Shop Museum (£82,200 over three years) to employ a Community and Learning Officer and materials to enable projects to take place. £31,400 year one.

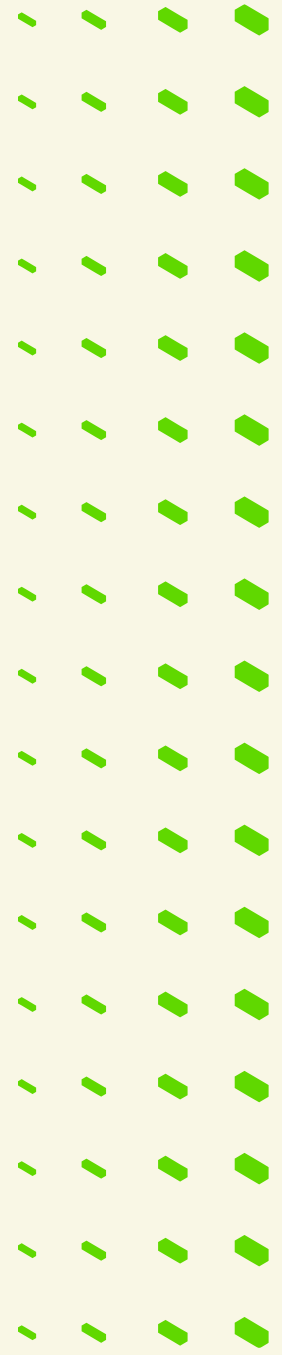

NDA Socio-economic strategy refresh 2023/24

- Under the Energy Act (2004), the NDA has a socio-economic role which recognises the importance of delivering the decommissioning programme in a socially responsible way. The approach to this is explained in the NDA Local Social and Economic Impact Strategy which was last published in July 2020.
- Since then, much has happened to shape the economic challenges, opportunities, and priorities in the communities around the NDA estate. The NDA is refreshing the Local Social and Economic Impact Strategy.
- Over the coming months the NDA wish to engage with stakeholders across the UK including LCLC's and SSG's to better understand the social and economic priorities in our communities to identify priority areas of focus, to align our internal processes and systems, and to make best use of the funding available across the group for maximum community benefit. Once developed, the new strategy will be subject to a period of public consultation including SSG's before it is finalised and published.

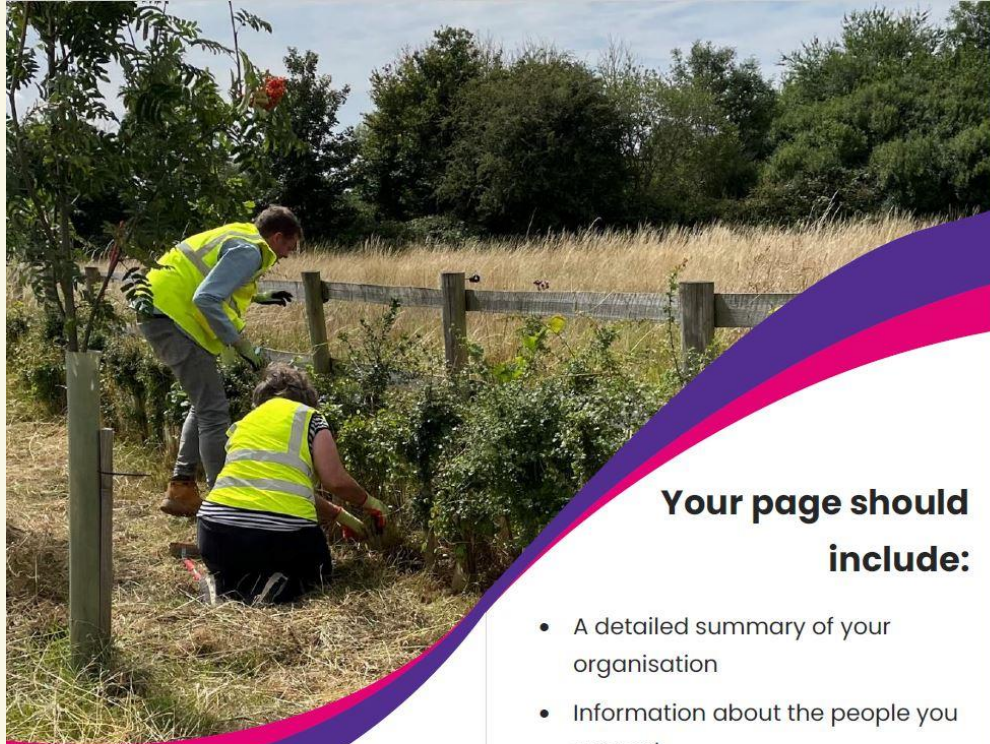
