Safety, Compliance and Environment

Conventional Safety

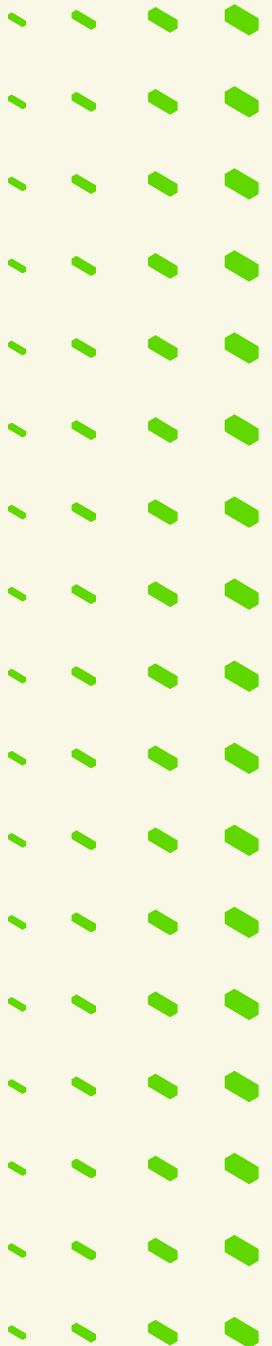
- ONR Inspection carried out on LC7 Operational Experience and LC11 Emergency Arrangements, both rated Green.
- Developing Emergency Preparedness improvement strategy.
- Fire system improvements to increase fire safety management on site.

NRS/EDF engagement

- Working together to look at potential shared aqueous discharge routes, work continues to look at potential options.
- Liaising with EDF on Environmental Monitoring Programme

EA engagement

- Improved EA engagement, holistic view of aqueous waste and Site Enhancement Plan produced and to be shared at next site visit.



Dungeness 'A' Sustainability Group

- A Road Show was held in November to promote the cycle to work scheme. Various bikes were displayed including e-bikes, attracting a lot of interest from staff.
- On the 5th February, the use of disposable take-away food containers has been discontinued. Staff and Contract Partners are being encouraged to either eat in the canteen or provide their own re-usable container if they require a take-away meal.
- The new volunteering scheme is being promoted, whereby staff interested in volunteering to support the local community can find opportunities via the Neighbourly platform.

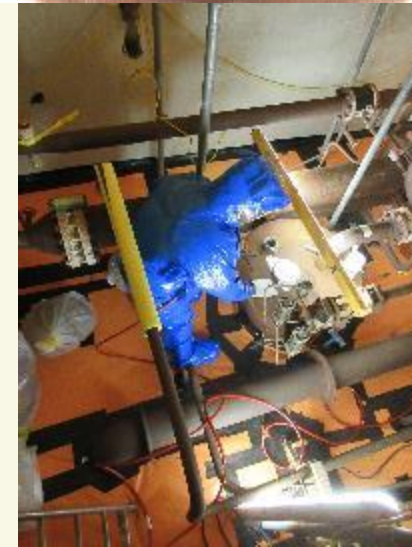

Waste projects update

- The Wet Waste Transfer Facility (WWTF) has filled 15 MOSAIK®DCICs with resin from the 2009 Pathfinder Project. The project is now size reducing pipework that was inside the Pathfinder DCIC for disposal.
- All residual resin that was left in three Caesium Removal Unit (CRU) vessels has been retrieved and packaged in MOSAIK® #15 from the Pathfinder project above.
- All desiccant has now been retrieved and packaged in 205l drums. Ten vessels emptied, filling approx. 20 drums
- The first Yellow Box® DCIC will be filled with sand and gravel from Settling Tank 2 in Feb/Mar-24 using the Vacuum Retrieval System



Waste facilities update



The Wet Waste Building construction at Dungeness A has been completed and handed over in less than 13 months since site mobilisation delivering a Group Key Target milestone.

Completed processing and Disposal of the following Radioactive Waste

- 1 x Shipment of VLLW Cladding (13m³)
- 1 x Contaminated Metallic Shipment (3.3te)
- 72 x Drums of Contaminated Compacted Combustible Waste (37m³)



Completed the Processing of the Following Rad Shipments for Disposal

- 1 x Contaminated Metal Shipment (3.4te)
- 32 x Drums of Contaminated Compacted Combustible Waste (16m³)
- 1 x Legacy Scaffold Shipment (8te)

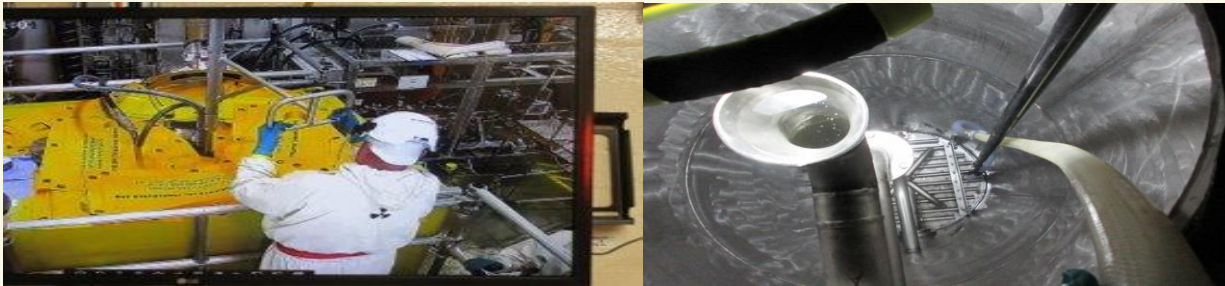
- CRC – 190te of Non Haz and 27te of Haz Waste

ILW Retrieval

Transfer of Resin from Pathfinders to IP2 MOSAIKs

- MOSAIK 14 has been retrieved and conditioned, with the contents of CRU'S 2/3 and BYPASS CRU emptied into MOSAIK 15. Final residue resin to be completed this month.



ILW Transport to Bradwell ISF (Interim Storage Facility)

- A total of 135 x MOSAIKs have now been transferred to Bradwell by Rail
- A further 2 x IP2 MOSAIKs and planned to be transferred this financial year

Recruitment - Apprentices

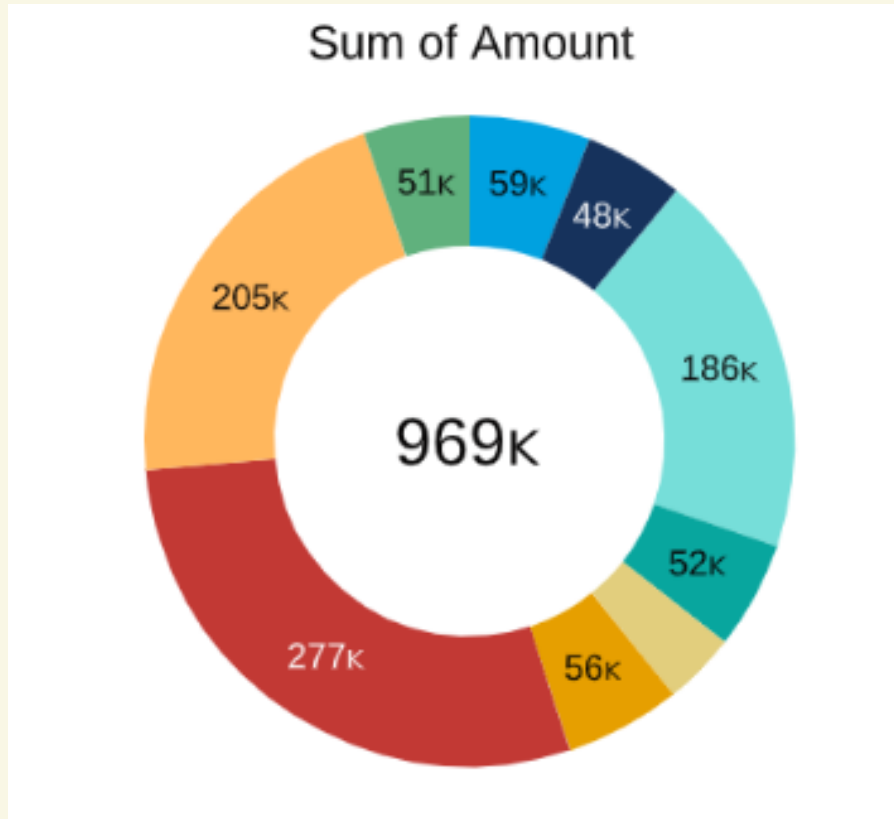

Socio Economic 2023-2024

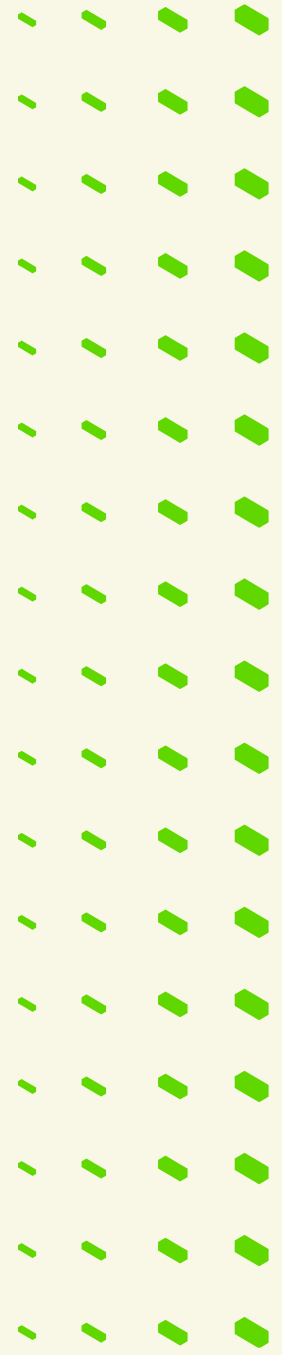
- Nuclear Restoration Services (NRS) Soc-ec Funding remains at £1,020,035 with £302,958 multi-year funding already committed for 2023/34.
- Good Neighbour funding £2,000 per application; however, £6,000 allocation per site remains unchanged. £5,902 spent to date through Dungeness A site.

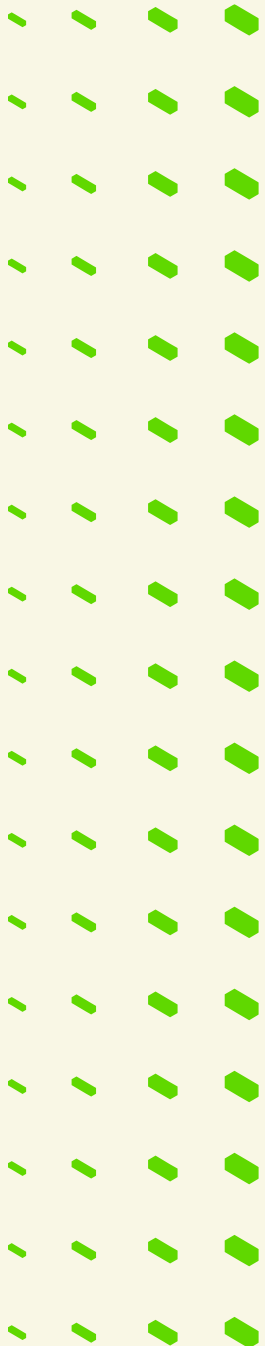
- **Marsh Academy and Romney Marsh Partnership £1,000** – networking workshops for 6th Form Students and local businesses
- **New Romney Country Fayre £1,402** – Materials and equipment for the Fayre
- **Caring Altogether on the Romney Marsh (CARM) £840** – Purchase of laptop
- **IMOS Foundation £1,000** – Towards information signage
- **1st Rye Scouts £1,660** – Purchase of new kitchen equipment for camping trips
- **FHDC Rural England Prosperity Fund (REPF) £44,000** year 2 – resource to manage and administer the REPF (£571,471) to maximise impact for the Romney Marsh. (£80,000 over two years).
- The **Romney Marsh Partnership** continues to be supported by NRS for the last three years alongside FHDC. (£90,000 overall)

Please note:

NDA Socio-economic Strategy Refresh 2023-24

- Under the Energy Act (2004), the NDA has a socio-economic role which recognises the importance of delivering the decommissioning programme in a socially responsible way. The approach to this is explained in the NDA Local Social and Economic Impact Strategy which was last published in July 2020.
- Over the last few months, the NDA has been engaging with stakeholders across the UK to better understand the social and economic priorities in our communities to identify priority areas of focus, to align our internal processes and systems, and to make best use of the funding available across the group for maximum community benefit.
- A new draft strategy has been developed and is undergoing a period of public consultation. This is ongoing and closes on 21 February 2024 before comments are incorporated where possible, finalised and published.
